The value of Scotland's food and drink industry, and the significant contribution it makes to our national and local economies and to our communities cannot be overstated.

What struck me was not only the use of quality ingredients by our producers but also the dedication, passion and care they put into their products.

It is this powerful combination that will ensure Scotland's place as a premier source of some of the world's finest food and drinks products.

Christmas is clearly one of the sector's busiest times and it is very important to me to give my heartfelt thanks to industry just now and to reaffirm that I do not underestimate the cumulative impacts that recent challenges have placed, and continue to place, on it.

In a debate in the Scottish Parliament, only this September, I acknowledged the value of the sector and welcomed the ten year plan published by Scotland Food and Drink to support it. The Scottish Government is investing £5 million to support the delivery of this plan and I hope that this will go some way to help the sector create much needed stability, sustainability, innovation and resilience, including in the face of ongoing challenges.

Lastly, it's your efforts that encourage people to buy our Scottish produce and your dedication that helps us to build a brighter future for our communities, including our vital rural and island communities. I want to express, again, my sincere thanks for your hard work and commitment and offer my very best wishes for Christmas and the New Year.
